"Blessed are the peacemakers" Matthew 5:9. Peace seems to be such an elusive concept. I almost added the words 'in todays world' but I don't think things have changed throughout the history of humanity. As our senses are bombarded with details of the most recent conflict between nations, whilst also remembering that other conflicts continue to cause untold suffering, I wonder if, like me, you despair that peace will ever be a reality?

I recently saw the picture below which was painted by Anja Rozen, a 13-yearold girl in Slovenia. Her work was chosen from 600,000 entries by children



around the world to create a piece of art to show what peace looks like. She is the winner of the international Plakat Miru competition. She wrote, "My drawing represents the land that binds us and unites us. Humans are woven together. If someone gives up, others fall. We are all connected to our planet and to each other, but, unfortunately, we are little aware of it. We are woven together. Other people weave alongside me my own story; and I weave theirs."

I love that image of being woven together. We may feel helpless in the face of global

suffering but we can all be peacemakers in our own communities; amongst our families, friends and work colleagues.

In November, when we commemorate Remembrance Sunday, we never glorify war but we certainly honour those who gave their lives for peace.

This can be a difficult month, the weather can be dreary, the days are short and we humans like the plants, would like to rest and keep warm. However we still need to work as usual, get up on dark mornings and go forward bravely. How much more courageous must the people in the present

This month we remember the group of men from the Forest who lost their lives in the two world wars and others whose names do not appear on the memorial. Although it is hard not to be depressed by the recent news the fact that we acknowledge these events is an encouragement.

We see the poppy wreaths at the Lychgate and all around the church, a wonderful spash of colour on cold miserable days. There is also a mysterious image joining us in the pews, an unknown soldier representing so many. It is a fitting reminder of courage in these dark times.



Barometers

Do you have a barometer in your home? Perhaps a little old one which has always hung on the wall and which we like to give an occasional tap to see which way the arrow is going. This type works on air pressure, measured by a spring in the device which reacts to the pressure in the house



and surroundings. The gauge reads

from extremes, generally high pressure denotes fair settled weather wheras low pressure means rain and storms. A sudden drop on the gauge is a cause for alarm especially for sailors.

A more attractive and interesting barometer is the Galileo type. This is a barometer made of a sealed glass cylinder containing a clear liquid and several glass coloured bulbs of varying density. The individual floats rise or fall in proportion to their respective density and the density of the surrounding liquid as the temperature changes. It is named after Galileo Galilei because he discovered the principle on which this barometer is based—that the density of a liquid changes in proportion to its temperature. This is not a very accurate reading but more pleasant to look at and can be read from a short distance.
