The stories in scripture show time and time again that God offers people a new beginning, another chance for better things. God frees the oppressed, Jesus heals and restores, and the Holy Spirit imbues new life.

When we're in a new situation perhaps we make resolutions. There is nothing wrong in making new year resolutions as long as we aren't setting ourselves up for failure.
